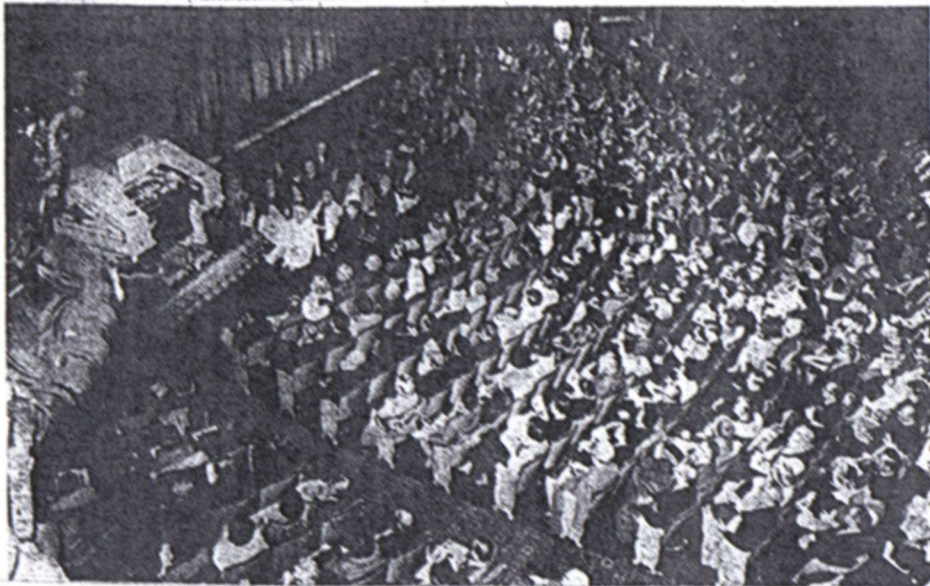

SAIGON (AP) — Fighting during Communist and Allied truces ushering in the Chinese new year—the Year of the Cock—has killed at least nine Americans and wounded 50, officials said Monday.

Allied forces reported 87 guerrillas killed.

Seven South Vietnamese soldiers were killed, 36 wounded.

TWO FIERCE battles flared Sunday 25 miles southwest of Da Nang, and a third erupted 25 miles northwest of Saigon.

Communists shelled two Allied outposts on infiltration routes to Saigon and sank a U.S. Navy patrol boat west of Saigon.

B-52s in one of their heaviest strikes of the war, flew 10 raids against Communist positions threatening Saigon just before the Allied 24-hour truce took effect at 6 p.m. Sunday (3 a.m. Columbus time).

18 Western Agents Freed

Moscow, Bonn Swap Spies

BONN—Russia has handed over 18 former counter-intelligence spies in a mass release of top-level West German agents.

Their release took place secretly over the weekend in the West German border town of Herleshausen.

It was said at his trial he engineered the transmission of 15,000 photostat copies of secret documents and 20 tape recordings of secret discussions.

Altogether he is believed to have betrayed 95 agents who were working in the East.
